Mrs Sue Maguire at Albany, WA, notified VVAA WA that her husband Phillip, a longstanding VVAA member, died on 29th December 2024. His funeral has been held. Allan William Cook of York, WA, a VVAA WA member died on 22nd February 2025. His funeral was held on Tuesday 11th March 2025 in the Uniting Church at York. VVAA WA member Kevin Trent, a licenced and authorised Uniting Church Lay Minister, conducted the funeral.

General News

I met recently in Perth with Andrew Nixon, the recently appointed DVA National Senior Chaplain located in Sydney, NSW. DVA is in the process of developing and raising a national chaplaincy organisation of former military chaplains as part of holistic care to veterans and families.

Following a concerned email I sent to DVA, I recently met in Perth with Ms Leonie Nowland, First Assistant Secretary Open Arms, and Mr Michael Burvill, Assistant Secretary for Clinical Operations, DVA, at their request. We discussed Open Arms (OA) staffing both local and national, and policy drivers behind OA staffing levels and processes. The current situation is there are 470 national OA positions, and due to Government policy, of these 117 positions are/were on 18-month contracts with no extensions, with their employment paused post-18 months of employment. They are placed in a pool to wait on changes in government policy. This knowledge has naturally caused concern among some veterans. However, it is important to note that OA services are managing, and those requiring an OA clinical professional will be seen, although with a short waitlist. OA has contracted extra Outposted Counsellors (community clinicians) around Australia. These clinicians are trained veteran and military aware professionals in private practice and supplement in-house clinicians and provide a spread including to regional and remote areas, where possible. Support can also be sourced with private practitioners paid for by DVA at no cost to the veteran. All veterans with at least one day of full-time service should have a DVA White-Card to cover treatment for all mental-health conditions and recognised/nominated medical conditions.

The Garden of Remembrance, Karrakatta, with plaque walls, has been closed due to safety concerns – built on uncompacted unstable sand. There are 17,000 plaques. The same situation is also in Tasmania. The Office of Australian War Graves in DVA is responsible for maintenance and upkeep. A Project manager has now been employed by DVA. Xray imaging is being used to discover the location of ashes scattered beneath soil without consultation or permission. It has been reported that everything will be eventually demolished with a new garden created and plaques (original, if possible, otherwise new) will be glued to a new wall structure. It has been reported that the Garden is open for the time being until funding can be secured by DVA.

Deputy Commissioner DVA WA Peter King is currently on leave until August 2025 when he resigns. Samantha Patuto is the new DC WA. Past positions: Public Service career at Centrelink Gosnells; Department of Home Affairs past 14 years – Immigration services, Detention in WA, Security. Samantha has been understudying Peter King for last several months. Thank you Peter for your support of all Vietnam veterans.

VVAA National Council and Congress, Canberra, May 2025. David Cockram and Allan Austin will attend.

Facebook VVAA WA page. Due to no use for many years, it was decided to delete the Facebook Page. This should occur soon.

The Committee agreed to a project to video record the historical biography of a significant cross-section of WA Vietnam Veterans. Don Dowling (former Army Chaplain) is prepared to do this. He has much relevant experience. We will seek DVA, Lotterywest, or other funding.



Vietnam War soldiers named on Inman Valley plaque immortalised in book

A story from the ABC about a community finally recognising its Vietnam veterans.

Five young men from the small community of Inman Valley in South Australia left their homes to fight in the Vietnam War. It was nearly 30 years after the end of the war before an honour board with their names was placed in the town's community hall, alongside those who fought in WWI and WWII, and most of them didn't know before being contacted by local historian Jo Lush.

Mrs Lush said she'd often pondered about the men and their stories and she set out to find them and make them "more than just a name on a plaque". Through social media and other means, she tracked down the surviving veterans much to their surprise. Four are still alive and live across the country, from a small farming community in Victoria to the wheatbelt of Western Australia. Sadly, one, Peter Millard, passed away in a car accident in 1968 but his sisters provided anecdotes of his time in the army.

As memories were sparked and the stories flowed, a planned leaflet became a book: The Vets of the Valley.

"It's important that they can tell their stories," Mrs Lush said. **But just as important that we have the ears to hear them.**"

Brian said, "I was an Operator Signals, 7Sig Regt based at Cabarlah in SE Qld. I was Med Dx at the end of 1986 with a spinal injury from a training accident and was classified TPI not long after.

My orthopaedic surgeon (PC Anderson) convinced me to enrol at university as part of my rehab. I graduated with a 1st in History in 1993, then in '94 was awarded a Cwlth post grad scholarship, which included a year at the Institute of Historical Research in London. My PhD examined the history of the modern concept of veterans' welfare and the birth of today's DVA model. Due to poor health, I was forced to withdraw from the PhD program in 1998 without completing the write-up. I was active for several years in the area of veterans' advocacy until health issues again saw me sidelined."

Christmas 1967 at Nui Dat- a trip down Memory Lane

At Christmas it is a time for rejoicing and a general "Cease Fire" was honoured. Many Vietnamese villagers living around the Task Force were Catholic refugees who had moved south of the 17th parallel at the time of partition in 1954 and at midnight they fired para-flares to mark Christmas Day.

For the diggers- we received lovely, thoughtful parcels packed by the American Red Cross, which were a joy to receive.

A big deal was the delivering of "café royal" by the officers, and the cooks made a special effort for Christmas dinner.

We also received a small, plasticised card outlining the Geneva Convention in relation to prisoners and the treatment of bodies.

Spare a thought for our Vietnamese comrades. South Vietnamese want to find and bury their war dead. Why is it so hard?

The Bien Hoa National Military Cemetery outside Saigon — now Ho Chi Minh City — was a "sacred place" before 1975, said Mr Tran, who has lived in Australia for 40 years after fleeing Vietnam as a refugee. But, after the communists took over, they destroyed it. They smashed the tombstones, dug up the graves, and planted trees to cover the land. "Their aim was clear: to erase us from history.

Hung Tran pauses, "I can still see their faces — the men I served with, the ones who didn't come home. They fought, they bled, and they died for their country," said the 73-year-old, who fought for South Vietnam in the Vietnam War. Half a century since the war ended, Mr Tran and others like him are still fighting to locate and bury the bodies of their fallen comrades. "They have no graves. No names. It's like they never existed," he said.

Australian historian, Robert Hall, who has aided the Vietnamese government in locating burial sites of North Vietnamese soldiers and returning personal artefacts recovered from the battlefield, says time is running out to find the remains of South Vietnamese troops. "It was extremely nasty straight after the war. South Vietnamese military cemeteries were bulldozed by the government," he said. While attitudes have softened and progress had been made, Dr Hall said "added sensitivities" made the logistics of locating remains even more difficult.

Vietnam's ambassador to Australia, Pham Hung Tam, said the government had allowed relatives to restore and relocate graves of South Vietnamese soldiers at cemeteries such as Binh An — formerly the Bien Hoa National Military Cemetery — which is now a civilian cemetery. "Thousands of these graves have been restored by relatives, many of which have been cemented," Mr Tam told the ABC. https://www.abc.net.au/news/2025-01-26/south-vietnamese-soldiers-long-to-bury-dead-soldiers/104828764
